



High Table Dinners

High-table Dinners (HTD) are originated from the formal dinner tradition in Britain's prestigious boarding schools and higher academic institutions with long years of history. A good illustration is captured in the movie "Harry Potter" with students wearing gowns, attending a grand formal dinner after the speech of their school master. The values of HTD are that it fosters a sense of identity in students, and provides an opportunity for community leaders and renowned people in town to share their experience with the students. It also enables the students to practice social skills, proper table manners, and people networking.

As a major college function, HTD at SPC is organized normally twice a semester. It is our hope that Shiu Pongers (SPCers), through participating in HTD under an elegant and refreshing ambience, will achieve the following education objectives:

- to feel at ease in attending formal social functions and get well versed to social and dining etiquettes, which will be beneficial for their career development;
- to learn to break the ice in interacting/communicating with High Table guests or guests at their table (Table Guests) and other unfamiliar SPCers as an enhancement of their social skills;
- to get insights from the speech or success story delivered by the invited speakers;
- to cherish the precious opportunity of learning from fellow SPC students assembled through HTD interactions while enjoying the dinner.

Given these values, the HTD is a COMPULSORY College function that all resident students are required to attend 2 times in an academic year.

Social Etiquette at HTD:

As the saying goes, "good manners will open doors that the best education cannot." The HTD is perhaps an epitome of one of the most important social rituals that each and every university student should have some knowledge and

experience of before they enter into society. All the etiquette and formalities allow the students to have a "taste" of socializing in a formal setting.

- Be punctual.
- Better stand up and shake hands with guests when greeting them.
- Dress up properly—Formal or Lounge-suit (i.e. a matching jacket and trousers/skirt for office work) is recommended for HTD and similar formal occasions.
- Never put things other than food or tableware, e.g. spectacles, handbag, etc., on the table.
- Show respect to the speaker by stopping all activities in progress (e.g. eating).





Lunch/Dinner and Tea Time with Master

Throughout the year, College Master will organize informal tea time, lunch or dinner gatherings for small groups of students. Guest(s) may be invited to share their personal story or experience during the gathering. Specific group of students may also be invited for informal exchange of views or simply for the purpose of getting to know about one another or about the College. GE COURSE IN RC: SAGE 102

SAGE 102 (First-year experiential learning) is a general education (GE) course designed to introduce the 5 competencies targeted in UM's Residential College (RC) education. Explanation and discussion of these competencies will be conducted in class in seminar/workshop format, including the use of games and projects to help students comprehend the related learning activities. It also provides students with active learning opportunities enabling students to make the transition from high school to university and RC life.



Students are required to attend all classes and finish a couple of assignments to show their achievements. Primary course assignments are blog writings on E-portfolio, which are designed to help students keep record of college life experience as well as reflective learning on college activities. Through the use of student E-Portfolio as a tool to assist assessment for student learning, students are expected to collect and select pieces of their own work and experience over a period of time as evidence of completing their learning objectives. Essentially, students have to write a rationale (reflection) to explain why they think the selected pieces are their best work to share or to showcase their achievement. Instructors of the class will guide students through the writing and portfolio construction process.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

As an integral part of the University of Macau graduation requirements under the 4-in-1 education model, "Community and Peer Education" is required of for all undergraduate students. For the educational benefits of individual students and the entire residential community, all SPC students are expected to actively participate in college activities, as part of the graduation requirements. Student performance in activity participation and E-portfolio writing will be tracked. Students should meet these requirements throughout their years at UM before graduation.

Move In / Out Procedures

MOVE IN PROCEDURES

- 1. Approach SPC General Office move-in counter for move-in procedure;
- 2. Present your student ID card/offering letter;
- 3. Complete SPC Move-in Acknowledgement form and submit a 1.5 inch/2 inch recent photo.
- 4. Pick up your room key card and room equipment checklist;
- 5. Return the room equipment checklist within first 3 days after moving in.
- 6. Remark: The record of utilities of each room will be posted at the common area of each floor on the morning of August 13. It will be considered as the initial reading for calculating your utility fees if you move in during annual mass move-in period.

MOVE OUT PROCEDURES

UM regulations require all first-year students to reside in the college, and actively participate in related college activities there. For upper class students, all requests for moving out college during the academic year, will be considered on a case-by-case application and be subjected to the final approval by the respective College Master in the academic year 2016/17.

學生領袖眼中的紹邦書院——你們是世上的光



湯皓璇 (Shawn)是 工商管理學院二年 級的學生,在 SPC 生活了一年,在本 學年擔任 SPC 院生 會的主席。SPC 在他 眼中是什麼樣子 呢?

紹邦書院的使命是建立在儒家思想的教導和基督教信、望、愛的精神之上,目的在於啟迪和激勵學生去尋找、反思和活出一個充滿意義和有價值的人生,並在其崗位上成為楷模,成為世上的光。

紹邦書院是住宿式書院。它不只是宿舍,更是同伴及社群學習成長的地方。不同專業、不同年級的同學一起學習,一起生活,一起參加活動,可以擴大同學們的交際面與知識面,豐富待人接物和處事的經驗,促進同學們的全面發展!

紹邦書院的生活環境是溫馨的。房間是雙人間, 四人一套。宿舍內冰箱、空調、書桌、衣櫃和鞋櫃等 設施一應俱全。四人公用一個廁所、淋浴房和漱洗

臺。每個樓層都配備有洗衣機、烘乾機和洗衣房。在洗衣房中有飲水機,並且 24 小時提供冷熱水。每個樓層有兩個茶水間,每個茶水間配備有冰箱、微波爐、電磁爐等設施,還有櫥櫃供同學們放置廚具。每個樓層還有兩個共享空間,內置很多桌椅,還有一個電視,同學們可以在裏面學習,也可以在裏面看電視、聊天等等。

書院的地面層配備有健身房·裡面有跑步機、划船機、啞鈴等設施器材· 想鍛煉的同學們可以經常去。還有鋼琴房和電子琴房·同學們可以憑學生卡 借用,既給需要練習鋼琴完成作業的同學提供了方便,也給業餘愛好的同學 提供了空間。書院還有舞蹈室、圖書館,以及一些可供舉辦活動的教室,可 以滿足同學們的業餘愛好,豐富書院生活。書院還有自己的餐廳,同學們每 週可以刷學生卡吃十五餐飯。

紹邦書院的院長是梁偉賢教授,副院長是屈鑑濠博士,還有兩位書院導師和四名辦公室行政人员。書院還有多個不同的學生團體及相應的學生領袖。例如,院生會,為書院學生服務,傾聽大家的意見及問題,并舉辦供全書院學生參加的活動。書院每個樓層都有樓層小導師和樓層助理,他們會幫助同學們解答生活中的疑難問題,舉辦樓層活動,建立團隊和生活上的友好關係,營造健康向上的樓層環境和氛圍。書院還舉辦豐富多彩的英語桌,在每週三、四舉行,讓成員可以跟以英語為母語的志願導師用英語交流,藉此鍛煉英語聽和說的能力。此外,還有各樣體驗式學習的活動機會,如英語營、築夢小隊、微電影工作坊、合唱團、舞蹈社、慧言堂(辯論社)、話劇社、廣東話班、書院大使等等。這些有趣又有意義的項目豐富了同學們的課餘生活,讓同學們能在活動的體驗過程中成長。

書院也會定期舉辦各種各樣的一次性活動,例如,一年三次的高桌晚宴是最大型的活動。一些知名的專家學者或社會賢達會來參加晚宴,并給學生做精彩的分享。同學們還能在晚宴上學到一些社交禮儀。書院還有一系列讲座、个人成长工作坊、文化體驗活動,和擴展知識前沿、國際視野的活動。院生會的活動有體育活動、才藝表演、學習交流講座。還有一些娛樂性活動,比如桌游、KTV party,以及一些社會服務性質的活動,去做志願者,奉獻愛心。樓層活動有電影欣賞/討論、體育比賽、製作甜點等等。這讓同學們的校園生活變得豐富多彩,而不是單調的學習。
